## **Bean There Done That**

Since October, GRBC has been a member of the SE CAROLINA for their BBO games, as are 172 other bridge clubs across North America. The plan is to have players from all member clubs choose SE CAROLINA's BBO games when not playing in their own club's BBO games.

This liaison with SE CAROLINA provides benefits for you as well as for GRBC. SE CAROLINA offers three games at different levels every morning, afternoon, and evening ... seven days a week. These games are able to provide a larger purse of master points. GRBC receives a portion of our member's entry fee from SE CAROLINA games. That's free money for us!

There are oodles of BBO game opportunities out there. It may sound like a broken 33½ LP record, but please use this chart as a guide for choosing where to play. The righthand column shows why it's important to Mister Bean.

From Mister Bean's perspective, our affiliation with 2/3/4, above, is purely a financial arrangement. Most of you know about finding a partner on Pianola by posting an ad. Did you know that you can receive emails that someone is looking? 
As the "The Answer Lady" I have been responding to questions from "newer" players over the past several weeks. A request has been made to share those players' questions and my responses in the Alert, essentially a column for the beginner player! Over the last few weeks, this column has attempted to address the topic of weak opening bids, including raising Opener's bid when Responder has support for that very suit. This week, a reader seeks advice when Responder has no support for Opener's weak but has a "good" suit of their own.

#### Question

My partner and I were the opponents sitting North/South on the hand shown below. As you can see, South passed at first opportunity and West opened the bidding with a weak 2♠ bid. After North passed, East (with a void in spades) bid 4♥ and made five. How did East know that 4♥ was the right place to be? What are the guidelines for bidding on when Responder has no support for Opener's weak two bid?

#### Answer

Thank you, interested reader, for sharing your timely question and hand. Barbara Seagram in her 2020 book *Barbara's Bridge Tips*, Part 1, Section 17, pp. 62-70 provides an excellent discussion on page 68 of pre-emptive bids, including responses to weak two bids. Some common options for Responder are as follows.

- Pass even with an opening hand and no support
- Raise partner's suit
- Bid a new suit

When bidding a new suit, Responder is denying support for partner's suit but should have at least a minimum opening hand and a good five-card suit. Responder should never bid a new suit with a pre-emptive hand of their own (never pre-empt over a pre-empt). Barbara suggests that a bid of a new suit by Responder be forcing for one round. If the bidding went 2 by Opener and 3 by Responder, Opener would raise the bidding to 4 if they had three hearts.

In the hand provided, Responder is sitting in fourth seat. Opener has bid 2♠, and neither opponent has entered the bidding. East has a void in Opener's suit (spades) and has not just five but seven hearts, along with 15 HCPs. The likelihood of Opener having the necessary three hearts to raise the contract to 4♥ is slim, so East bids immediately to 4♥.

Here is another hand below (a F2F game, so the bidding sequence can't be displayed). West opened the bidding with 2♠ and North overcalled 3♥. East as Responder has limited support for West's spades but has a good suit of their own, namely diamonds, and a void in hearts, and so they bid 4♠. South supports the hearts with a 4♥ bid. East, not to be outdone, bids 5♠, making seven (West did not bid on with no support for diamonds). East ruffs the first heart, pulls trump, and leads the ♠K to partner's hand, overtaking it with the ace and discarding dummy's losing spades on the long spades. A club lead would limit the contract to six.

### A Student of the Game


My baby has gone to college. I am standing in his empty room, contemplating my empty life. The phone rings. It's Holly. 'Bridge lessons? Why?'

But then, why not? At that point my friend could have suggested fly fishing or funnel cake baking and I would have gone. But it just so happens to be bridge, and bridge is where I follow her. The next day we head out to a place called the Indianapolis Bridge Center, oddly enough. It's in a drab business area and while its industrial carpeting and fluorescent lighting aren't exactly warm and welcoming, I soon find out the people are.

Noel is our teacher. She is pretty and nice. She is teaching beginning bridge. And when I read the first page of the beginning text book titled *Bidding*, I feel confident. It starts out: 'There are four suits in a deck of 52 cards'. Simple. This should be fun.

Fast forward... It's been four weeks since we began our bridge lessons. I liked Noel at first. But now she is saying things like 'The opening can open the bidding with 12 or more points. The overcaller can have 7 to 17. The responder to the opener must bid with at least six points and the advancer to the overcaller must remember only to count on her partner for seven points.' And if that isn't bad enough, she continues with, 'A strong hand is opened with an artificial bid of two clubs that has nothing to do with the club suit and, in fact, if you do have a strong hand in clubs, ignore it...'

By the end of the *Bidding* series, I'm thinking back on the phone call I received from Holly and wishing she had suggested rocket science lessons instead. I think I could have done that.........." Excerpted from *The 8 of Clubs Was Good? Comfort Food for the Bridge Player's Soul* 





## **Dear David**

## The Law of Empty Spaces


Okay, okay, okay – it's not really a law, but it does sound cool.

♠AK108
♠Q53
♦1073
♠1052
♠K104
♠Q632

I♣ by West, 1NT by East – all pass.

South leads the ullet 3 and declarer wins the third round. The ullet Q and a spade to the ace is next, both opponents following with small spades. Now declarer decides to lead the ullet 4 from dummy. North pops up with the ace and leads the  $llet Q \to 3$ , 2, 4. A low heart now goes to the king and ace. The llet K is next, then a club to the queen, North showing out on the third round. What do we know? We know South had four clubs. It has been confirmed that South started with four diamonds since North did not cash a diamond when he was in with the llet A. South has followed to two rounds of spades and two rounds of hearts = 12 cards accounted for. When you lead a third round of spades at this point, South follows with the llet A. You have accounted for all 13 of South's cards, so you play the llet K, knowing that North has the singleton jack left. Making 1NT. Count, count, and count again.

So, what has all this to do with empty spaces? Here is the entire hand.




Declarer mistakenly won the FIRST round of hearts (Q, 3, 2, A), so he has only an inferential count – South has four clubs, four diamonds, one heart, and two spades = two unknown cards. North has two clubs, three diamonds (assumed), one heart, and two spades = five unknown cards. If you were looking for a needle in a haystack, would you look in the pile that had two unknowns or the pile that had five unknowns. Logically, the pile with the greater number of unknowns is more likely to be the one with the needle. When you are looking for the location of a specific card, the hand with the greater number of unknowns is usually your better bet.



1. Game forcing

I was South, defending against 3NT. My partner's opening lead was the ♠3, and my ♠8 lost to West's ♠Q. West then led his ♥6 to dummy's ♥7, which I took with my ♥Q. At Trick 3, I led the ♠10, which held. If you were in my shoes, what would you do now?

#### **SOLUTION**

Let's count Declarer's tricks. Assuming he has one more heart (highly likely, given the way he is handling the heart suit), there are five potential heart tricks in dummy. He probably also has the ♠A (since it looks as if he ducked your ♠10 in an attempt to sever communications between you and your partner), potentially leading to seven tricks in the majors for him. That means he needs only two tricks in the minors to make his contract. If he holds the ♠AK, there is nothing you can do. If, however, he holds only one of them, let's say the ♠A, he must have the ♣Q based on his bidding. If so, there is the danger that he can develop his ninth trick in clubs by leading the ♣Q as soon as he gets in. If this is the layout, here is the position with ten tricks to go.




Given this scenario, you must lay down your ◆Q right now at Trick 4! (You're not giving away a trick because with a singleton diamond in dummy, Declarer cannot finesse your ◆J later, even if he holds the ◆10.)


When you lead your ◆Q, there are two possibilities.

- If Declarer ducks, you can probably assume that he doesn't hold both the ◆A and the ◆K. Now you can safely continue diamonds.
- If Declarer takes your ◆Q with his ◆A, you can't be sure who holds the ◆K (even though your partner might try to signal, it's always possible that he doesn't have the right cards to guide you.) Even so, there is no reason for you not to lead another low diamond as soon as you regain the lead with your ♣A.

Here is the complete hand.



Your diamond attack was almost as deadly as a heart attack!

- For online games only, log in to the game in question and register yourself on the Partnership Desk tab (or look to see if someone else has already registered there).
